<u>2024 YEAR OF PRAYER</u> Pope Francis has named 2024 the Year of Prayer, a year spent in preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year Pilgrims of Hope. There's a new page on the Clifton Diocese website to share news about the year of prayer, new resources to deepen your prayer life, and point towards celebrations that will come in 2025.

The first event for the year of prayer will be a livestream on the diocesan website <u>Pilgrims of Hope: The 2025</u> <u>Jubilee in Clifton</u> **1 February (7:30-8:45 pm)**. It will introduce the jubilee year, providing context for the current three-year programme (2023 – Year of the Council, 2024 – Year of Prayer, 2025 Jubilee – Pilgrims of Hope), as well as background for jubilees – how they originated, their role in Scripture, and how jubilees have been used in the Church. It will conclude by exploring the theme that pope Francis chose, Pilgrims of Hope, and how Clifton Diocese can journey together over the next few years towards this great celebration.

FATHER PHILIP WRITES in some years, we get a Second Sunday of Christmas that is not Epiphany. Then we have the Visit of the Wise Men on the 6th January its proper date and the third and last Sunday of Christmas is celebrated at the Baptism of the Lord. There is no First Sunday in Ordinary Time, only a First Week, beginning on the Monday or Tuesday.

The Feast of the Lord's Baptism completes the majority of Christmas time. There is, of course the traditional outpost of Christmas on 2nd February, the Feast of Candlemass, the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple. We shall consider that when we get there and till then the Crib,

now become the Epiphany House, will stay up. There is a beautiful circular symmetry to Christmas Time, for it begins with the Lord's own birth in the flesh and ends with our

mystical rebirth in the waters of the Font. The Baptism of the Lord is the moment when He leaves His anonymity behind and the quiet rhythms of the Carpenter's Shop to step out of the crowd and be acknowledged by John as the One Foretold. The signs and wonders at the Jordan attest to Who He is. There's no going back or hiding.

We Christians like to hide or keep our heads below the parapet. Perhaps this is because Catholics were so long persecuted by the Anglican State. We got the vote in 1829 and we got a proper diocesan structure on St Michael's Day 1850. Persecution is well behind us. We need to get used to witnessing boldly to our beliefs and values in our modern world. Pope Benedict XVI told both houses of Parliament when he visited us that Catholics in particular, and Christians in general, must make our voices heard in the marketplace. This statement acknowledges that there are other voices,

but it does not concede superiority to them. Like all market traders, we try to be heard, to attract



attention and sell our product. We don't really sell and our faith is not a mere product, but the image works well to explain our place in the world and modern society.

Most Catholics are baptised as children and babies, although I was christened as an Adult.

It is easy to see how Baptism is not an end, but a beginning.

Neatly, therefore the end of Christmas Time leads us into green time and the time after Epiphany leading towards Lent. It moves us forward with conviction, joy and strength.

Baptism is the basis of all endeavours for Christian Unity. Please not the Ecumenical Service at Dursley Methodist Church in the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. This Octave began amongst non-Catholics seeking reunion with the See of Peter. It should not therefore be difficult to Catholics to embrace it whole heartedly. Since the reign of Pope St John XXIII Catholics of East and West have stopped taking a back seat. We believe that we have something to offer other baptised people. We share devotion to Our Lady and the saints with the Orthodox and with some Anglicans. Likewise, our belief in the Mass is shared. Our unique contribution is the Petrine Office, vested in the Pope as Bishop of Rome and Successor of St Peter. For us, the Papacy is part of fabric of Christianity, its Faith and Order. We believe all Christians need the help of an authoritative voice to interpret Scripture and Tradition for today.
