THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD – THE END OF CHRISTMAS-TIDE FOR NOW We began Christmas-tide when it got dark on Christmass Eve. We have marked the birth and the appearing of Christ. In many ways, we have celebrated the meaning of these things more than the events themselves. Whilst our ancestors extended the season for 40 whole days, in more recent centuries we finish a bit earlier. Nevertheless, we will keep the 40th Day after Christmass Day as the Feast of Candlemass and it will and can displace a Green Sunday.



It is an outpost of the season of the Incarnation. Rather neatly, these days, we start Christmas-tide with the Birth of the Saviour and we finish with marking our own rebirth in Him through Baptism. The Saviour had no original or actual sin to wash off. Neither did He need to be adopted by the Father,

because He is the Only Begotten, "full of grace and truth"! It is because of these facts that John the Baptist was reluctant to perform the dipping of the Christ in the Jordan. There were two reasons that John didn't know and which Christ revealed to Him. The first is that, like the Birth in Bethlehem, this is an act of solidarity with sinful humanity. Secondly, Jesus is not being hallowed by the waters, but is making them holy and pointing forward to the sanctification of His followers in the Sacrament of Baptism He has yet to institute. In a way, He hallows not just the waters, but also looks forward to the redemption of material creation in its entirety. [St Paul writes to the Romans in Chapter 8, "*For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our <i>bodies.*" He points out that whilst we receive salvation through the gift of the Holy Spirit in Baptism



and Confirmation, the completion of redemption will come at the end of time.]. Byzantine Catholics and the Orthodox perform the Great Blessing of Waters at this time. Worshippers get soaked in church by sprinkling and often a cross is thrown into the sea, a river or a lake for younger members of the Congregation to dive in and retrieve. We shall not be doing this in Dursley or Nympsfield, so you can put your swimming costumes away, especially the Osma Ladies! We are very

grateful to Ellis in His Baptism and Confirmation this weekend, in giving us a visible reminder of our own entry into Christ and His Church, without jumping into cold water. Most of us were not baptised as adults and have only seen this Sacrament performed for others, often children of family and friends.

ASSISTED DYING BILL - PUBLIC MEETING WITH SIMON OPHER MP Friday 17th January 7.30pm at Dursley Tabernacle. Simon Opher, MP for Stroud, is willing to discuss with the public the issues around the implementation of the Assisted Dying Bill. Kim Leadbeater's Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill passed its second reading on 29th November by a wider than expected margin, 330–275. But this is just the first hurdle the bill will face. The bill has been committed to a public bill committee – a group of MPs, yet to be selected, who will go through the bill line-by-line, scrutinizing each clause and proposing amendments. Simon Opher hopes to be on the Bill Committee. This meeting, chaired by Revd Simon Helme, will give an opportunity to reflect on the Commons vote in November and the challenges faced in implementing the bill with proper safeguards in place.

HOLY HOUR, FRIDAY CONFESSIONS & MASS Friday is for busy working folk, who can't get to morning masses during the week, but who feel they need more than just Sunday. Holy Hour (adoration and benediction) is golden opportunity not afforded to every parish for quiet time with Jesus. Confession helps with both of these and makes things easier for those who work on Saturdays
