



RC MARRIAGE LAW This reminder is headed RC because other, non-roman parts of the Catholic Church in communion with the Pope have their own Marriage Law. You can consult the Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches if you wish to learn more. This is not the place to spell everything

out. The Gospel of the Wedding at Cana is, however, a good opportunity to remind all St Joseph's and at St Dominic's that our rules apply to everyone baptised into the Catholic Church at whatever age. It also applies to all folk who have been received into full communion with the Catholic Church. It applies to all RCs living within our two parishes, even if they go elsewhere, as is their right. If you are contemplating Holy Matrimony (the Sacrament where both parties are baptised Christians) or Matrimony (non-sacramental marriage where one or both parties is not baptised), please consult the Parish Priest of Dursley & Nympsfield before you make too many arrangements. It is possible to keep our law and be married in another Christian building attended by one of the parties.

ST. THOMAS AQUINAS St Thomas was very clever, holy and fat! He came from a noble family, being born in the family castle at Aquino, then in the Kingdom of Sicily and now in Lazio. The family intended that he should remain wealthy and extend their influence. They wanted him to stay on at Monte Cassino Benedictine monastery after schooling there and become Abbot. He did not. Despite their protestations, imprisonment and temptations, young Thomas became a mendicant friar, a Dominican, living on what he could beg, and people gave. After his Benedictine schooling, he studied in Paris and was a student of another Dominican saint, Albert the Great.

He had a brilliant mind and was an outstanding teacher of others by word and by writing. Above all, he was master of the scholastic method of the Middle Ages, arguing in formal disputations both viva voce with other scholars and also in written form. He was able to synthesise the Greek philosophy of Aristotle with Christianity. He is

a patron of those sitting exams and of students (those who actually study, not just attend colleges and courses).

Ultimately, he is a saint not because he was clever and wrote wonderful books. We can't all do that and copy him. He is a saint because he was a good human being, who tried to live close to God. This we can all imitate. His size made it hard for him to sit close to the table and eat. In a world that is obsessed with dieting and the body beautiful, a corpulent saint is an encouragement to many of us.

He died at Fossanova Cistercian abbey as he travelled north from Naples on papal orders on the 7th March 1274. The Dominican provinces of Italy and France both claimed the body of the man they knew to be a saint. The squabble was most unseemly. The Abbot eventually gave the skeleton to the French and the flesh to the Italians after the relics were boiled to separate them out. The skeleton is in Toulouse, but the boiled flesh (and fat) never left Fossanova!

He is a Doctor of the Church and is known as the Angelic Doctor. The Pontifical University of St Thomas Aquinas (where Pope St John Paul II studied) is familiarly known as the Angelicum!!

30th JANUARY - ST CHARLES OF ENGLAND, KING & MARTYR? No! King Charles the First of England, Scotland, Ireland and France was not a saint. He was beheaded on the orders of Parliament on the 30th January 1649 at Whitehall. His wife, Henrietta Maria of France remained a Catholic on marriage and she maintained a Catholic Chapel Royal. Although he himself was not an RC, the King was tolerant of us Catholics and several of his generals during the Civil War belonged to the Catholic Church. He appointed a pro Catholic Archbishop of Canterbury, William Laud, who negotiated a scheme which would have seen the Church of England, lock stock



and barrel, return to full communion, with a married clergy and an English language liturgy. The Civil War prevented this from ever happening at the time. Whilst the King kept court in Oxford, the first post Reformation statue of Our Lady was erected over the main door of the University Church of St Mary. It is still there. Charles was in many respects an arrogant and foolish man, but he believed staunchly in Apostolic Succession and Episcopacy against the Parliamentarian side who were Presbyterian. He allowed RCs freedom of worship. Both of his surviving sons became king and both died as RC's, Charles II and James II. One of his great grandsons was Bonn Prince Charlie and his brother, Henry Benedict Stewart, was a cardinal of the Holy Roman Church and presided over 3 papal conclaves.
