### SIMPLE WAY TO REMEMBER SOME OF THE VITAL ELEMENTS OF PRAYER

Almost all of us learned an Act of Contrition by heart, when we prepared for First Confession. Older prayer books give other acts. One way to remember some of the most important elements of prayer is the word ACTS

A = Adoration. This is praise and the acknowledgment of God's glory

C = Contrition. This is sorrow for sin and the acknowledgment of that we are sinners in need of His mercy

- T = Thanksgiving. This is self-evident
- S = Supplication. This is asking for things if they are in accord with God's will for us and others.

CHANGES TO OFFERTORY PAYMENTS BY STANDING ORDER Offertory donations are essential to help meet the costs of running our Parishes, whether that be heating bills, maintenance of the buildings or paying our Priest. One of the easiest ways to donate without having to remember to bring anything with you on Sundays is to set up a Standing Order. If you can Gift Aid the donation that is even better, as the Government will then add 25% to this out of the tax that you pay. You can also Gift Aid donations at any time even if you do not use Standing Orders. Donations to the Hall Fund can also be Gift Aided. Gift Aid forms, Standing Order forms and Ad Hoc envelopes are all available at the back of the Church. Most of those of you who are already donating by Standing Order do so direct to the Diocese and they then pass the money on to us. This will be changing in the next few weeks,

#### AN OVERVIEW OF LENTEN SUNDAYS YEAR C In

accordance with Sacred Tradition and the long practice of the Church, we are given a course in penitence, in how sorrow for sin and turning towards Christ and His way of life, will bring me at Easter putting His new life into my baptismal incorporation into Christ. The Renewal of Baptismal Vows and Sprinkling with Holy Water is where this is all going at the Great Paschal Vigil and First Mass of Easter. The washing of sin is accomplished by Baptism for those who have not yet been christened, and by "dry cleaning" for those of us who have received the saving waters of the font. Using the Old and New Testaments in tandem, the Church asks us to look at ancient and life-giving themes.

1. On the First Sunday, it speaks to us in our first two readings of faith. Each of us is invited to accept the truth of the Gospel with our minds and to trust with our hearts. Temptation seems to be stronger when our faith is weak. We are invited to grow in faith, therefore.



- 2. The Second Lenten Sunday of Year C takes us to consider the Covenants that God makes with human beings, living relationships with the Living God, based upon mutual promises, inaugurated with sacrifice and always indicated by a visible sign. The Transfiguration gospel shows us not only the uncreated light of Christ, but in Moses and Elijah we have reminders of the covenants of old to help us recommit to the New and Eternal Covenant in Christ's blood.
- 3. The Third Sunday brings us to the need for conversion of life. Jesus makes possible what He asks of us, to turn from sin and believe in Him. We are to leave vice and embrace virtue. It is taking on board once more the living relationship from which we drift.
- 4. On Lent IV, Mothering Sunday, the Church gives us the Gospel of the Prodigal Son and speaks to us of the Father's forgiveness. If we do indeed turn afresh to God, we need to be assured of the warm welcome (the ring and the robe and the feast on the fatted calf)
- 5. Lent V the start of Passiontide brings us to mercy, the loving kindness of the Father, embodied in Christ, that does not just forgive, but which restores us to beloved sons and daughters.
- 6. Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, as the hymn says we arrive at Lent VI ready to walk with the Saviour into Jerusalem with palms and lives we lay down before Him. The Stational Procession of Lent I will thus turn into the Triumphal Entry and prepare us through the suffering and death of the Lord, to walk in procession behind the pillar of light [The Paschal Candle] out slavery in darkness and sin into the Easter Glory of Resurrection.

Faith, Covenant, Conversion, Forgiveness and Mercy will enable us to walk into Holy Week and out of the Empty Tomb, reborn through our living, loving, and longing, during these weeks.
