

CHANGES TO OFFERTORY PAYMENTS BY STANDING ORDER Offertory donations are essential to help meet the costs of running our Parishes, whether that be heating bills, maintenance of the buildings or paying our Priest. One of the easiest ways to donate without having to remember to bring anything with you on Sundays is to set up a Standing Order. If you can Gift Aid the donation that is even better, as the Government will then add 25% to this out of the tax that you pay. You can also Gift Aid donations at any time even if you do not use Standing Orders. Donations to the Hall Fund can also be Gift Aided. Gift Aid forms, Standing Order forms and Ad Hoc envelopes are all available at the back of the Church. Most of those of you who are already donating by Standing Order do so direct to the Diocese and they then pass the money on to us. This will be changing in the next few weeks, and you will receive a letter asking you to change your Standing Order instruction so that the money comes directly to the Parish. 


THE FIG TREE We hear from Christ this Sunday the Lenten message of repentance. We are to be sorrow for bad things done and for good things not done. But more importantly, this sorrow for sin is to be made visible and concrete in our lives. This is not misery but positivity. Changed lives are what we see repeatedly amongst the people who meet and follow Jesus. The Apostles themselves are a prime example.

St Paul and St James in their Letters stress the need for Faith to bring forth good works. It is not just good deeds without faith. They are teaching what they have learned from the Master. Faith must be fruitful in

good works, that others can see and copy. Thus, others will be led to the Lord. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven", as St Matthew records in the Sermon on the Mount.


This Sunday, the Saviour moves from urging repentance to the fruitless fig tree. He uses it to teach His followers and us, that we must turn to the Lord and bear fruit in holiness. We are not to get bogged down in depression, weeping and wailing. Sorrow for sin is a positive thing, bringing us to live holy and virtuous lives.
