



THURSDAY 29TH MAY - THE SOLEMNITY OF THE LORD'S ASCENSION - HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION After many requests and petitions of the faithful, the bishops



of England and Wales asked the Holy See for permission to restore Ascension Day to its original date, the Thursday 40 days after Easter. Having kept in on the following Sunday for a number of years, it may have slipped people's notice that it is a Holy Day of Obligation, a day equal to a Sunday and of sufficient importance in the Christian life to make us come together for Mass. It reminds us all that heaven is the goal and that Christ came to take us there, dealing with our waywardness and sinful deeds. It also shows us that from being in specific places and times, the Ascension is the passage of Christ

from the 'there and then', into the 'always and everywhere'.

ROGATION SUNDAY AND THE LITANY OF THE

<u>SAINTS IN PROCESSION</u> The fifth Sunday after Easter Day, Easter VI, is traditionally known as Rogation Sunday. The title comes from the Latin verb ROGARE to ask for things. Rogationtide occupies the Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday before the Ascension, when the Lord said that in going to the Father, His followers would be able to pray in a new way, "through Jesus Christ Our Lord..."


Rogation also relates to the natural world. Spring is lurching into summer, and the Spring Ploughing and Planting are often seen as

the start of the Agricultural Year. The custom was to get out of the church building and visit farms and fields and places of work. The Litany in procession is a thing of fun as well of serious beseeching! A priest friend of Father Philip's refers to it as a cope and wellies job!!

As we become more aware of our responsibilities towards the care of our environment, we do not need neo-pagan invocations of mother earth or the Great Goddess Gaia, a simple return to our own ancient traditions and a little gentle updating is all that is required. The Industrial Revolution reminded us that factories as well as farms are places of work and within the scope of our prayers and God's blessings. Industrial and agrarian chaplaincies are normal parts of Church life. Dursley's transition from wool weaving to industries like Lister's shows how we should transition in church too.

It does us good to get out of our buildings and into the open air. Our singing and processing

are acts of witness in an age much in need of evangelisation. Many do not notice or want to notice that the Church is still here, alive and kicking. Christians frequently seen as killjoys and party poopers. It is good for our neighbours to see us happy, enjoying ourselves out of doors. As society rediscovers its connections with nature, we never lost ours and are on hand to show them how to



honour the Creator, as well as care for creation.

Rogation is just part of the Church's connection to the environment. Plough Sunday in January, Lammas or Loaf Mass in August, Harvest Festival have often been side-lined and poopooed. We thought we were too modern and sophisticated for such things, and yet our world and its environmental disasters are showing us that we were more foolish than wise.

Schools, factories, farms, craft ataliers, shops and boutiques, we will happily bless the lot. When not invited into specific businesses, we can triumphantly march round the streets and parish boundaries praying and singing with the saints.!
