
A MODERN ASCENSION HYMN - TUNE "THAXTED"


On His throne in highest heaven Our Saviour takes His place Now and always on the Mercy Seat, the throne of endless grace. All you servants of the Living God, now sing and clap your hands For the Lord Who once was crucified is Prince of all the lands. There are nine days after Ascension and before Pentecost. These constitute the original Novena. The theme of that original was waiting for and preparing for the coming of the Holy Spirit.





Since then, many novenas have been devised and prayed by the faithful. Prayer as such is one of the themes of this part of Eastertide. The feast of Our Lady, Queen of the Apostles is observed by many missionary orders and parishes (including Cheddar). The Book of Acts says that the Ascending Lord sent the Apostles back into Jerusalem to await the Spirit and goes on to describe how they met for prayer in the Upper Room with Our Blessed Lady. Behind the hard work of mission and evangelisation lies a prayerful support and intercession. The Poor Clare nuns have been described as the energiser battery behind the work of the Franciscan Friars. We don't have to be consecrated religious to

pray and wait upon God.

Christ at the Last Supper spoke of unity amongst His followers as being important because it will help the world believe in our Christian message. Christian unity, its work and prayer, is a theme of this Late Eastertide. Falling out and falling apart is not difficult or hard work. Building bridges and reconciling are. Catholics cannot opt out of the Ecumenical Movement just because we have preserved the original faith, order and unity of the Early Church. It is simply dangerously arrogant to say, 'We are right, and they are wrong'. We cannot pretend that other Christians do not exist. We must do what is necessary to understand where they come from and how they may find their way into Catholic Unity. God is generous and gives gifts to all who love Christ, and we must discover and appreciate gifts given to other Christians.

Since the Octave of Pentecost was abolished in 1969 there has been no Red Week in which to celebrate the Spirit, so Late Eastertide has taken up this role. The Disciples went back to Jerusalem to wait and watch and pray and so must we! The colour is white but the theme of the Holy Spirit is definitely with us. The Saviour is an advocate Who ever pleads our cause in heaven, a Comforter, a Paraclete. He promised that in leaving us physically, He would send us another Paraclete to be with us for ever, the Spirit



of Truth. Having celebrated the Solemnity of the Lord's Ascension, we can turn with confidence to that promise and open our hearts to receive the Promised Spirit.

It is asking a lot of us as Christians to digest the Ascension completely in just one day, so meditation on this theme is also a part of Late Eastertide. Christian Prayer is made "through Jesus Christ Our Lord, Who lives and reigns....." Christ not only ascended, but opened wide heaven's gates for us to enter in heart and mind. The Nicene Creed makes a point to telling us that Christ ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. This Session at the Right Hand is a very

important truth for us in prayer. He is the champion to the Father of all our just causes and the bearer of our concerns.

Another theme is waiting. Most of us could do with more national.



Another theme is waiting. Most of us could do with more patience. It is not wasted time, when we wait. John Milton famously concluded his sonnet on his blindness with the immortal words, "They also serve, who only stand and wait". We are waiting for the Spirit and waiting for Christ to come again. We are waiting for growth in holiness, for the expansion of God's Kingdom on earth. If we wait, God will grant, will clothe us with power and show us the way to be useful for His plan.
