
ST BENEDICT OF NURSIA, FATHER OF WESTERN MONASTICISM

On the 21st March 547, St Benedict died at Monte Cassino on the Italian Peninsula. Because this is often in Late Lent – Passiontide, the General Calendar of the Roman Rite keeps him on the 11th of July as the anniversary of the translation of his relics at Fleury in France in the 8th century.

He did not start the monastic explosion, for that honour goes to Egypt and to St Anthony thereof. His genius was born out of prayer and experience. He took from the writings of St John Cassian and a document called the Rule of the Master and fused all this into the Holy Rule of St Benedict. It is followed by men and women around the world and their contribution to Christianity is immense.

The Rule taught its followers to read and study besides spending time in church at the Office and Mass. Their preservation of classical Greek and Latin learning was vital for civilisation itself. In addition to prayer and mission, their monasteries were centres of medicine, education, agriculture, horticulture, hospitality.

The Rule said that there should be physical work as well as spiritual and mental work. They ran monastic farms and herb gardens. The farming fed Europe and the herbs formed part of medicine, nursing care and hospice work. They valued balance and avoiding extremes in religious life. Gregor Mendel the father of modern genetics was a Benedictine, as was Dom Perignon of Champagne fame. Much literature and art has emerged from the sons and daughters of St Benedict. They brew and distil, as well as growing grapes. The Holy Rule is also followed by the Cistercian Order, and they too are great brewers, especially in Belgium.

Benedictine and Cistercian monasteries figure in the spiritual lives of many Christians, friends, oblates and visitors. Many famous people have owed much to St Benedict and his balanced and wise way of living. Downside, Prinknash and the sisters at Brownhill all testify to this in our own diocese and those who live around these monasteries or who work at them owe them a great deal.

In England, Benedictines took over the running of several medieval cathedrals, because of their involvement with the mission to England sent by St Gregory. As a result, one ecumenical aspect of St Benedict's legacy has been his influence on the Daily Office of the Church of England, beginning with the Book of Common Prayer in 1549. There are several Anglican Benedictine Monasteries and these days they are listed in the Benedictine Yearbook as being part of the family.

The CSMV sisters from Wantage, who became Catholic together, have adopted the Benedictine Rule, Habit and Office and now live in Birmingham. New monasteries spring up around the world. It would seem the Holy Spirit inspired and filled the work of St Benedict, and the Spirit continues to give life and growth through the example and rule of St Benedict.
