idea is that they start in September and carry on from there, meeting monthly or every other month, as they chose.



FR. PHILIP WRITES St Dominic and St Francis founded orders of Friars. There are other Friars. There are Augustinians, Mercedarians and Trinitarians. The memorial of Our Lady of Mount Carmel reminds us of the White Friars or Carmelites. They began life as unconnected hermits living on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land, during the Crusader Kingdom of Jerusalem, also called Outremer. They made a hero of Elijah the Prophet and saw the beauty of the mountain as a reminder of Our Blessed Lady. With the fall of Jerusalem to Saladin and the forces of Islam, it was no longer safe to stay put. These hermits returned to Europe. St Simon Stock and others reorganised them at Aylesford as the Carmelite Friars. The enclosed sisters were the powerhouse of prayer behind the active brothers. By the time of the Protestant Reformation, many Carmelites had lost their way and become very lax in their religious observance. St Teresa of Avila and St John of the Cross in Spain undertook the reform



of the order and this led to the current groupings of the Calced and Discalced Carmelites for men and women. Clifton had a Carmel of women at Wells for over a century and a convent of men at Wincanton.

As can be seen in the picture, legend tells of the gift of the Brown Scapular to St Simon at Aylesford. Many faithful lay people are enrolled in this and many more embrace Carmelite spirituality, through the writings of St Teresa and St. John of the Cross.

Off shoots of the Carmelite Friars also exist, like the Teresian Sisters, who mostly run posh girls'

schools in Spain, but also ran schools for the poor, including the primary school in Wells, up until 1935

BASTILLE DAY The 14th July is the anniversary of the storming of the Bastille fortress and prison in Paris by the forces of the French Revolution in 1789. Not only did they guillotine Louis XVI and his wife, they also murdered many ordinary French people during what became known as The Terror. Although the principles of Liberty, Equality, Fraternity are in accord with the Gospel as we understand it, the Revolution wreaked havoc on the Church in France, probably because its Bishops and Higher Clergy were inextricably tied up with the Nobility. The new Republican State tried to separate the Church from Rome and to subjugate the clergy

and people to itself. To this day, most church buildings are the property of the State or the local municipality and some of been demolished simply because civil powers can't afford to maintain them.

The Revolution gave the Church martyr saints like the Carmelite Sisters of Compiegne, immortalised in an opera by Francis Poulenc. Seminaries went underground. Orders hid or went abroad. The English Catholic emigrés returned home after centuries of refuge in France and the Low Countries from persecution at home. By then, England was more tolerant, and the King actually funded a refuge in Winchester for returning English RC priests. It was this house that gave Salisbury its first parish clergy since the Reformation and helped found St Osmund's before the restoration of the Hierarchy on St. Michael's day, 1850



APOSTLESHIP OF THE SEA - THE STELLA

MARIS In the Middle Ages, Our Lady's name, Latin Maria or Hebrew Miriam, was believed incorrectly to mean Star of the Sea. When the Apostleship of the Sea was founded, she was the natural choice for a heavenly patron. St Nicholas of Bari and various others were considered but they settled on Our Lady Star of the Sea!



STELLA MARIS The chaplaincy centres and social clubs are mostly called the Stella Maris around the world.

JULY IS DEDICATED TO THE PRECIOUS BLOOD OF THE SAVIOUR. WESTMINSTER METROPOLITAN CATHEDRAL IS CALLED AFTER THE PRECIOUS BLOOD (Last month was for the Sacred Heart, not Gay pride)
