THE ADVENT PRESERVATION SOCIETY 2024 Before we get annoyed with those who do not keep Advent, we must admit that it is probably not their fault. They don't know what it is or how to keep it. The commercial world has largely convinced people that shopping for Christmas IS Christmas. The advertising experts have eliminated the word PREPARATION, even though that's what they want us to do in our shopping and wrapping and sending. The other clever deception they practice upon us is that the season of Christmas started the day after Halloween (or American Thanksgiving) and runs up to and ends on the 25th December. Thus, they have apparently squeezed out the season of Advent altogether. Because that's how it looks, many think that's how it actually is.



Even Christians are conned and pressurised into starting Christmas too soon. They pay lip service to Advent with purple in church, but they organise carol services and children's nativities from 1st December and are bored with the Lord's Birth before Boxing Day even arrives.

We do gently need to remind our fellow Christians that we don't have Easter parties, bunnies and chocolate in Lent. We don't anticipate the Resurrection before it happens and we should not anticipate the Nativity before it happens either.

With all that said, the "getting ready for Xmas" is still going on. You find Advent if you look carefully. The turkeys are not roasting yet, let alone chestnuts on an open fire! We need to be strong and hold fast to the keeping of Advent. We must explain firmly but politely why it matters, things like "Christmas is coming doesn't mean that Christmas is actually here yet". We must remind folks that the shining days of Christmas only start when it gets dark on Christmas Eve and they stay with us part Epiphany to the Baptism of the Lord. The Season has 3 Sundays in it!!!

TAPESTRY Probably, the most famous tapestry in Britain today was designed by John Piper and hangs behind the high altar of the modern Coventry Cathedral. After it had been hanging for a while, they realised it suffers (as we all do!) from gravity – the bottom was sagging because of the weight. The problem is now fixed and carefully monitored. Although the modern Anglican cathedral was built recently, the hanging of tapestries in

cathedrals goes back a very long way. They were used to illustrate all or part of the Christian

message and also to insulate worshippers from the cold of the thick walls. Few of these survive. Some even used carpets and expensive Persian rugs.

One notable exception to this is the Tapestries of the Apocalypse in Angers in France. The set is no longer complete, but largely so and is most impressive. They illustrate the Book of Revelation. They were removed and dispersed by the horrors of the French Revolution, but they were reassembled



thereafter. One panel was found being used as an eiderdown on a canon's bed and another was found in the market under a pile of potatoes. Today, they are housed in a purpose-built museum in the adjacent chateau of Angers.

Furthermore, Angers houses another set of non-religious tapestries in the Hospital of St James. The hospital was built on the orders of King Henry II of England and Anjou as part of



his penance for the murder of St Thomas of Canterbury. Today, no longer a hospital or old people's home, the building houses some wonderful works by Jean Lurcat, called the Song of the World, le chant du monde. Lurcat was involved in the rediscovery of the Apocalypse tapestries. Against black backgrounds the designs and picture are worked in bright colours, orange, yellow and red. The ten Lurcat panels came to live in Angers in 1966.
